**CROSSLINK INTERNATIONAL TO SEND HOSPITAL
EQUIPMENT**

St. Charles Borromeo Philippine Medical Mission (PMM) is pleased to have the support of CrossLink International in helping promote basic health care in the Philippines. A non-profit organization, CrossLink provides medicines, equipment and supplies, eyeglasses (through Lions International) to developing countries and local clinics that serve the neediest. CrossLink acquires these from pharmaceutical companies, hospitals/hospices and doctors.

Organized from a Sunday School class at Columba Baptist Church in 1993, CrossLink is now supported by churches, foundations, and individual donors. To date, it has sent a total of \$18 million worth of medicines and supplies to 77 countries. Crosslink is licensed by the Virginia Board of Pharmacy as a distributor of proprietary medicines.

On 12 September 2000, Micheline Toussaint, St. Charles Social Justice Director, and Celia Coronado, PMM, met with CrossLink Project Director, Linda Cook, to discuss how the Philippines can receive assistance from CrossLink. On 4 March 2001, Crosslink sent a huge shipment of medicines and supplies worth \$11,000 to the Foundation of Our Lady of Peace Mission (FOLPM), a beneficiary of PMM. This shipment was done in collaboration with Northwest Airlines and PMM members Lloyd and Yael Celis.

In August of this year, CrossLink will send hospital beds, wheel chairs, operating tables, gurneys and other miscellaneous equipment to FOLPM. Crosslink and St. Charles Church will fund the shipment cost.

PMM: A MICROSTRATEGY TO REDUCE POVERTY

Since 1993, the World Bank has consistently advanced the argument that "unhealthy countries are condemned to slow growth". There are two views that are equally true: [1] that ill health reinforces poverty, and [2] that poverty causes ill health. (The Economist:1999). It is in light of these arguments that PMM draws its dream and vision: To promote in the Philippines the inherent right of the poor to be healthy, to survive with dignity, and to receive basic health services.
